# **Commissioners Join Other Oregon Counties in Sending Letter to the Governor**

#### The Letter Opposes the Governor's, OHA's and OSHA's Recent Mandates on Oregon Businesses, and Strongly Urges Them to Reconsider Their Actions

(Douglas County, Ore.) The Douglas County Board of Commissioners, as a part of their unwavering efforts to help our local businesses and communities during this pandemic, sent another letter to Oregon's Governor yesterday. The latest letter expresses their opposition to the recent mandates and guidance issued by the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and the Oregon Occupational Safety and Health (Oregon OSHA) on private businesses and churches to verify the vaccination status of individuals prior to allowing a person to frequent that business or church without a mask or other face covering. The letter is part of a cooperative group of county commissioners that are in opposition to the recent state mandates. The initial letter was written and sent to the Governor by the Jackson County Board of Commissioners on Wednesday, May 25, 2021.

RE: Oregon Health Authority and Oregon Occupational Safety and Health Mandates for Private Businesses

Dear Governor Brown:

We, the Douglas County Board of Commissioners, oppose the recent mandates and guidance issued by the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and the Oregon Occupational Safety and Health (Oregon OSHA) on private businesses and churches to verify the vaccination status of individuals prior to allowing a person to frequent that business or church without a mask or other face covering. These new mandates and guidance are misguided and place unfair and undue responsibilities on local businesses and churches, and their employees and leaders.

To comply with the OHA and Oregon OSHA mandates, local businesses and churches will be required to train their employees to examine and determine the authenticity of medical records. In addition, these employees will need to be trained to interpret these medical records for the purpose of determining if an individual is "fully vaccinated" based on different protocols for the different vaccines being administered in the community. If an employee makes a mistake or miscalculates a "fully vaccinated" date, the business or church will be looking at fines or other administrative action from Oregon OSHA. The only other option is for a business or church to simply require all employees, and others, to continue to wear masks, socially distance, and take like actions, which disregards the recent advice and guidance issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

This requirement, for businesses and churches to independently verify vaccination status, does not appear to be corning from either the White House or the CDC. As far as we are aware, no Federal agency or entity is requiring proof of vaccination (vaccine passports) or recommending that local businesses and churches implement a vaccine passport checking system. We do not understand, nor believe there is a reason for, Oregon implementing such a system at odds with the Federal, scientifically backed, guidance that has been issued.

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As a practical matter, requiring businesses and churches, and the employees of those businesses and churches, to verify a person's vaccine status is only going to lead to conflict between employees and customers. As Douglas County's restaurants, venues, churches, and other businesses have been devastated by shutdowns, restrictions, and limitations on their ability to provide service and function for over a year, the last thing any of these businesses and churches need is yet another, scientifically unsupported mandate from the State of Oregon that is only going to lead to conflict as these businesses and churches and their employees begin the long and arduous task of attempting to rebuild what they have lost.

Vaccines are readily accessible to any eligible resident of Douglas County who wants to receive a vaccine. Any resident of Douglas County can walk up or call to obtain a vaccine without an appointment. Douglas County and our local health partners have implemented several outreach programs that bring the vaccines directly to our small rural communities, farms and business. This is the time to be easing restrictions, not creating new mandates in the guise of easing restrictions.

It is time to take the burden off of our businesses and churches and return to normal.
